


With the emergence of a highly infectious human virus that resulted in the global COVID-19 pandemic in early 2020, society at large was shuttered in an unprecedented way. This included animal shelters, that had to close their doors to the public and find new ways to support their communities, including the animals in care. Reducing

2020 AND THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

homes to keep animals out of a central shelter facility, empowering community members to directly reunite stray animals with their families, and supporting pet owners to find solutions to care for and prevent relinquishment of their companion animals. The positive results of this shift are evident in the 2020 statistics, with historically low shelter intake and increased live outcome rates, particularly for cats. This is likely because the reduced intake and lower in-shelter population during the pandemic meant organizations were closer to their Capacity for Care, enabling them to optimize outcomes for animals in care.





Total intake of cats and dogs to shelters 140,000



Historically high levels of adoption and low rates of euthanasia for cats. This may be because fewer animals were in care and shelters could remain at their capacity for care, optimizing outcomes and moving animals to new homes more quickly.
