Subject: One Year After ACA Repeal Vote, Key Races Like Colorado's 3rd

Congressional District Are Up For Grabs

One year ago, President Trump and congressional Republicans proclaimed victory with a Rose Garden celebration after narrowly passing a bill to repeal the Affordable Care Act (ACA) through the House of Representatives. Though they were ultimately unable to fully repeal the ACA, approval of the ACA remains higher than disapproval, concerns about the repeal effort have sustained among a huge segment of the electorate, and the electoral damage to congressional Republicans like Scott Tipton has been lasting, according to new Public Policy Polling survey conducted in Colorado's 3rd congressional district.


When it comes to the ACA, voters are supportive of the law: 47 percent approve compared to just 37 percent disapproving. However, when it comes to fixing the ACA or repealing it and starting over with a new health care law, there is a much greater appetite among voters to improve the ACA: 62 percent think it should be made stronger rather than repealing it. Moreover, a plurality (47 percent) agreed Republicans are trying to undermine and sabotage the ACA because of their failure to repeal it. Additionally, overwhelming majorities of voters in CO-3 register major concerns about different consequences of the health care repeal effort pursued by Republicans, including:

- 65 percent of voters express major concerns that repeal would eliminate protections for people who have pre-existing medical conditions.
- 65 percent of voters express major concerns that repeal would allow insurance companies to charge people 50 years of age and older up to five times more than younger people for health insurance.
- 63 percent of voters express major concerns that repeal would cause increases in health care premiums by 20 percent.

Finally, it is clear from this survey that Scott Tipton is viewed unfavorably, will face a tough re-election campaign, and remains burdened by the issue of health care.

- **Approval rating:** Just 32 percent of voters approve of Tipton's job performance, while 44 percent disapprove.
- **Election matchup:** Tipton is supported by 44 percent of FL-18 voters compared to 42 percent supporting his Democratic opponent a statistical dead heat.
- **Health care repeal vote:** 44 percent are less likely to support Tipton because of his vote for repeal, compared to 34 percent who are more likely to support him.

Public Policy Polling surveyed 632 voters in Colorado's 3rd congressional district from April 30-May 1, 2018 on behalf of Health Care Voter. The margin of error is +/- 3.9%. This poll was conducted with automated telephone interviews.



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
